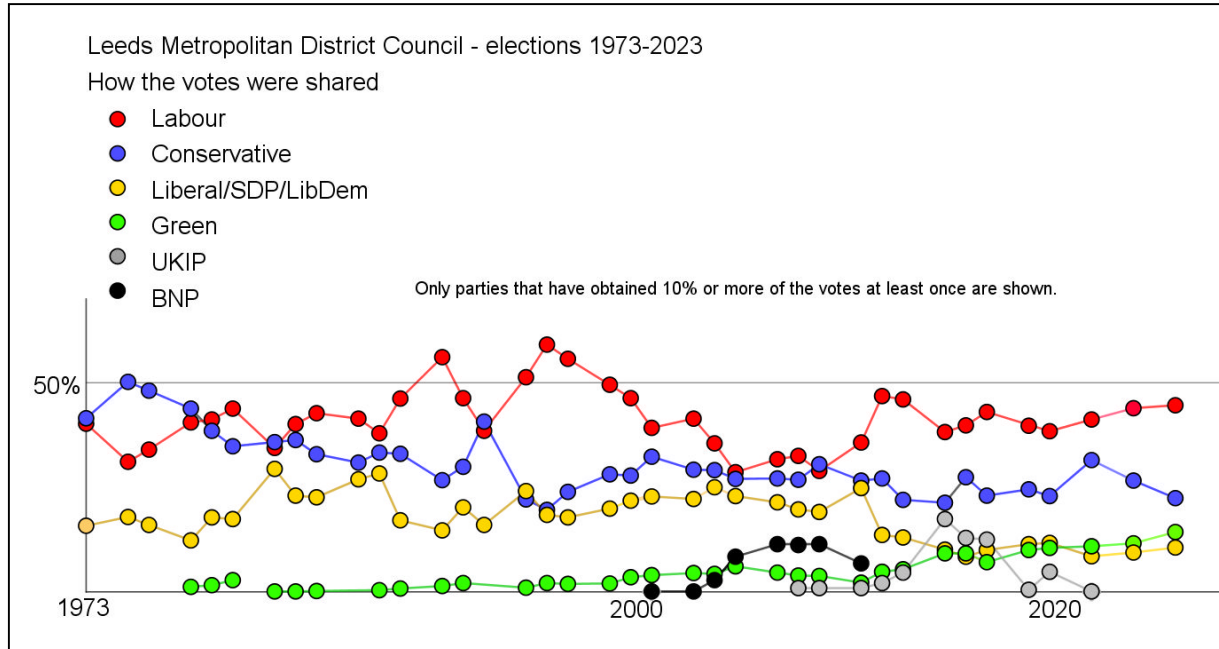




## Leeds Metropolitan District Council Elections Share of the vote between the political parties 1973-2023



This document gives the share of the votes obtained by the candidates for each party at each of the local elections since the Leeds Metropolitan District came into being following the local government reorganization of 1973.

Initially the wards in the new Leeds Metropolitan District consisted of twenty-one wards from the previous City of Leeds: Armley & Castleton, Beeston & Holbeck, Bramley, Burley, Burmantofts & Richmond Hill, Chapel Allerton & Scott Hall, City & Woodhouse, Cookridge & Weetwood, Gipton & Whinmoor, Halton, Harehills & Roundhay, Headingley, Hunslet, Kirkstall, Middleton, Moortown, Osmondthorpe, Seacroft, Stanningley, Talbot, and Wortley, together with eleven wards from the previous West Riding: Aireborough, Garforth No. 1, Garforth No. 2, Horsforth, Morley No. 1, Morley No. 2, Otley, Pudsey No. 1, Pudsey No. 2, Rothwell and Wetherby.

*Note:* In multi-seat elections the votes for each party are counted as the average vote for their candidates in each ward.
